



BONHAMS TALKS TO CATHLEEN GOUVEIA

Design Principal Cathleen Gouveia Design



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1) How did you get started in interior design?

My design career began in the New York advertising industry. My undergraduate degree was a B.A. Degree in Marketing and Advertising from the Pennsylvania State University. I worked on Madison Avenue for 10+ years as a Senior Account Executive/ Supervisor at Saatchi & Saatchi / NYC, among other agencies. I attended the School of Visual Arts for post-baccalaureate studies in Film Production and Interior Design. My professors there secretly urged me to transfer to the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) where I graduated with Honors and an MFA in Interior Architecture and Design in 1998. While in residence, I studied Interior Architecture, Design, European Art and Architecture, Antiquities, Decorative Arts and Architecture; with additional studies abroad in London, Paris and Rome – and traveling extensively throughout Europe. After graduation, I relocated from NYC to San Francisco in 1999 where I collaborated with several of the finest interior design firms in San Francisco. (These studios designed Four Seasons and Ritz-Carlton hotels, large highend residences, etc.). Cathleen Gouveia Design was established in 2003 in the seaside town of Sausalito, CA. (www.gouveiadesign.com) I became the President of ASID Northern CA in 2016/17 and work with clients throughout the Bay Area and beyond.

2) How would you describe your style or design aesthetic?

My design style mirrors the rich personal history of each design client. No two projects are alike. What distinguishes my work is attention to detail, a sense of elegance (neither masculine nor feminine), and a tendency toward minimalism. I believe that interiors should be clean, comfortable and classic. The visceral story related to the client's history infuses the design with the occasional unexpected. I believe that spaces should appear collected and curated over time; with many furnishings that are custom, bespoke, and one-of-a-kind. I rely upon the history of the building, the client, and surrounding areas to curate the appropriate furnishings, art, and antiques for each space. The spaces that I design unveil after repeated visits; with impeccable finishes, art and antiques. I enjoy modulating modern art with antiques to bring soul and a sense of history to a place.

3) What inspires you?

I am most inspired by the stories that my clients tell me about their lives as I embark on the journey of designing their residences. I also find vast inspiration through by my travel experiences and living abroad in England, while visiting France, Italy, Germany, Belgium, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Switzerland, and Austria; Bermuda, Mexico and Bora Bora. I am obsessed with items that are handmade, with refined or rough textures and finishes. History is the ingredient that weaves the spaces and pieces I design together. Exotic hardwoods, stone and metal inspire me from a design standpoint, especially when used in innovative ways.

4) How do you integrate traditional pieces into contemporary design?

Antiques, artifacts and traditional items are incorporated into my design work by deciding which pieces will be the focal point and which will be flanking or accompanying. Antiques add texture and character to an otherwise flat design scheme that can feel too cold, modern, or even alienating. Antiques and traditional pieces can, if carefully curated, add a sense of history, and character to a space. They provide a counter point or voice against the architecture and the soft scape of the project; a soul otherwise lacking in modern design spaces.

5) Any emerging design trends that are noteworthy?

There is marked resurgence towards Modern Design versus more traditional or transitional design styles. Gold has made a come back, as metallic finishes are used against more natural wood finishes. 'Statement' lighting fixtures and chandeliers are big right now, as are punctuation pieces that are trending towards the organic. Textural hand carved antiques with a rich time worn patinas add character and richness against modern pieces. Stone, metal and wood are working in harmony and patterns are more graphic or restrained but used sparingly. Art seems to be trending modern or decidedly classical with gilded frames. Open plan kitchens and living room spaces are being designed with larger expanses of stone and quartz surfaces – with

waterfall drops which is the latest trend. The smooth kitchen surfaces seem to be driving accompanying pieces and use of antiquities and artifacts that are more eclectic, soulful or textured.

6) What would your dream project be?

My dream is to specialize in coastal respites including modern or traditional residences or homes on stilts on the coasts of Los Angeles, Nantucket, East Hampton U.S.; and residences or villas on the coast of France or Italy. These residences are modern or traditional with period antiques. I enjoy infusing the spaces I design with the elements: earth, wind, and fire; and finishes: stone and metal; and I always try to build in a few design elements that have never been seen before.

I have a true passion for vintage Chris Craft boats and would also love to design a fresh lake oasis or boutique inn accessible only by boat for celebrities such as: Meryl Streep, Jennifer Lawrence, Cate Blanchett, George Clooney, Robert Downey Jr., Matthew McConaughey, or Will Smith.

At some point in my life, I hope to work with a renowned architect to design a folded house with sliding planes and a rotation of fine art and antiques. This house would reside within the dunes and turn inside out with distinctive modern fireplaces and staircases that can be reconfigured.
